Dr. Ezekiel Alembi teaches oral literature at the Kenyatta University where he is also the Director of Kenyatta University Radio Service. He studied at Kenyatta University in Nairobi, Kenya where he got his BA and MA degrees before proceeding to the University of Helsinki in Finland where he defended his PhD degree under the supervision of Professor Lauri Harvilahti. He studies funeral songs and has written extensively on other genres, especially children's oral poetry and folklore in electronic media. Alembi has presented papers at many conferences including folklore congresses and conferences in India (1995) and China (1996), Germany (1998), Nairobi (2000), Sweden (2003), Estonia (2005) and Argentina (2007). He has attended Folklore Summer Schools in Finland in 1997 and 2002. Alembi held a successful series of lectures at the Department of Estonian and Comparative Folklore at the University of Tartu in Estonia in 1998. He has written many books for children and is a member of many scientific organizations including the Folklore Fellows Network and International Society for Folk Narrative Research (ISFNR). In ISFNR, Alembi is the Vice President in charge of Africa.

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Mait Talts has studied history at the University of Tartu, Estonia and graduated as book historian from the Department of Information Sciences of Tallinn Pedagogical University (now Tallinn University). He is working as academic secretary at International University Audentes (IUA) in Estonia and researcher at IUA Institute for European Studies. His interests are in large extent related to the history of Buddhism in Estonia and the less known chapters of Estonian cultural history. Mait Talts is a member of Tallinn Bibliophiles' Association.

Among his major contributions is the type index of Maltese folktales (1978); other titles include *Il-Praspar miktuba minn Dun Xand Cortis* (1991), the critical edition of Magri's folktales *Manwel Magri: Hrejjef Missijertna* (1994), and *Il-Leġġendi ta' Ġużè Delia* (1996).
